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Momma's House serves as home to young women who are pregnant and have chosen to have their babies. The women come to Momma's House in desperation because they are either homeless or abused in a crisis because they are pregnant.

The women may live at Momma's House before and after their babies are born for a period of up to two years. During that time, the women receive support and encouragement needed to prepare for the day when they and their baby will leave. The women will have a good job that pays benefits by the time they leave. Equally important, they will have had guidance in parenting and personal responsibility. The women leave knowing that they have overcome some tremendous personal obstacles; they have matured and have accepted the responsibilities of motherhood.

Momma's House is in the midst of a capital campaign to raise funds for a new home. "We always have a waiting list, said Pat Shea, founder of Momma's House. "There is a tremendous unmet need to help more women who chose to carry their baby to term."
