## 17 founders of nonprofits will be inducted into the Long Island Volunteer Hall of Fame

The man who saved the Fire Island Lighthouse for future generations, and a woman who established a home and future for homeless young mothers, are among 17 founders of nonprofit groups who will be inducted Sunday in the Long Island Volunteer Hall of Fame. Four of the founders were nominated posthumously.

Each of the inductees

founded an organization that in some way improved the quality of life on Long Island, said Diana O'Neill, executive director of the Long Island Volunteer Center. The fifth annual ceremony at the Carlyle on the Green at Bethpage State Park "celebrates people who bring out the best in all of us," she said.

For Thomas Roberts of Bay Shore, cited for historical preservation, it began in 1979 when the Coast Guard wanted to demolish the lighthouse, which had guided ships off Fire Island since 1858. off rire Island since 1858. Challenged by his wife, Marilyn, to "do some-thing," Roberts, a "com-mittee of one," wrote to everyone up to President Jimmy Carter. The Fire Island Lighthouse Preservation Society, which he organized in 1981, succeeded in getting the lighthouse transferred to the National Park Service, but the park service

needed money to restore it. The preservation society raised \$1.2 million, and the lighthouse beacon, dark for 12 years, shone again in 1986.

Today the lighthouse, run by the society in partnership with the park service, is visited by 120,000 people a year. "It feels good to see the excitement of the children coming to the lighthouse. We teach them about the environment, wildlife, lifesaving and Long Island nautical history," Roberts said. Roberts, 67, a banker and president of

the Tri-State Appraisal Group, also delights in seeing the light, visible for 22

For Patricia Shea of Massapequa, founder of MOMMAS House, the defining moment came in 1984 when a homeless young woman asked her to baby-sit and never returned for the month-old boy. "I

knew we had to do something," said Shea, a social worker and lifelong volunteer who had been taking pregnant teenagers and mothers with newborns into her own home although she had five children of her own.

The desperate young women "need more than a bed," she said.

The first MOMMAS House opened in 1986. The name, derived from Mothering Adolescent Services, was chosen because "it sounds warm-er," Shea said. Young women, 17 to 21, enter a two-year program with an emphasis on education and "giving them the tools to be good mothers." There are now two MOMMAS houses in Glen Cove and Jericho and two transitional apartments in East Massapequa for mothers leaving the program because "it's almost impossible to find affordable hous-

ing on Long Island."
The group now is searching for another five-bedroom house to rent. For more information, the
